But we don't believe we're going too far out on a limb with this one: Color knitting is going to be hot." We agree. Having mastered scarves, socks, lace and fancy stitches, knitters and crocheters need a fresh challenge and

color suits the season. Colorwork garments, cowls and caps are frequenting the pages of fashion magazines and book titles. *** INQUIRING KNITTERS WANT TO KNOW ***

One of the biggest changes we've seen during our 30 years in business is the steady growth of the Internet. Through our ever-expanding website, our monthly newsletter updates are read globally by our subscribers. Recently, Janice S of England e-mailed: "I am making a garment and have come across the term 'wrap 1 and turn' and am not sure what to do". Janice also wrote, "I will keep using your website, as our knitting group is looking for ideas and group projects to start for our Summer fetes and bazaars. We love all the American things as they are so innovative and colourful".

Thank you for your e-mail, Janice. "Wrap and turn" is a knitting technique most commonly used when working a "short row". Short rows are partial rows done to shape knitting, such as sock heels, necks, or shoulders. The row is worked part way, then turned back and forth until the required number of extra rows are completed. The "wrap" is worked to prevent a hole when turning. When you reach the point where you are to turn, slip the next stitch. Bring the yarn from the back to the front of the work if knitting, or from the front to the back if purling. Slip the stitch back to the left needle, thus wrapping the stitch that was slipped, then turn your work. This is what is meant by "wrap 1 and turn". Be certain that the yarn is in the correct position, depending on whether the next stitch is knit or purl, and continue back across the row. After the short rows are completed, and you are ready to work the wrapped stitch, pick up the wrap with the tip of your right needle and work it together with its stitch. This will hide the wrap, and the shaping will have a smooth appearance.

*** KNITTING FOR DIABETICS ***

Lisa Carnahan of LISA KNITS tells us that knitters are singing the praises of her "Boomerang Socks" for people with diabetes, multiple sclerosis, peripheral neuropathy or impaired circulation in the feet. The traditional German style heel shaping features a smooth heel with less pressure and minimal ridges. Lisa's patterns are available in 6 sts per inch or 8 sts per inch gauge, and cuff-down or toe-up versions (\$4.00 each, shown lower left). Since the gusset is reversible, the entire sock may be worked with the smoother knit side against the skin for added comfort, if desired...

*** FIBER-TASTIC FIBER TASTING SPIN-IN ***

Spin happy? We can help. All spinners are invited to join us to celebrate spring and Earth Day on Saturday, **April 24, 2010, 9 am - 5 pm**. You may bring your own spinning wheel, pull up a chair, and "taste" samples of premium natural fibers from KRAEMER YARNS (Pennsylvania fibers), BROWN SHEEP YARNS (USA fibers) and LOUET YARNS (North American fibers). Roving and fiber will be available to purchase and we will also have a selection of locally processed Pennsylvania, clean premium wool and

mohair fibers available to purchase.

A large basket of locally-made drop spindles will be available for you to try (ages 10 & up, please), or you are welcome to try basic spinning on our shop model LOUET S-51 spinning wheel under the supervision of our instructor, Tracey Earhart. There is no charge to attend the fiber-tasting or how-to sessions, but we do ask that you call ahead, as space is limited and we would like to assure that plenty of fiber is available for everyone to enjoy...

*** WAVE & SHIELD SCARF ***

Our thanks to our dear designer friend and nationally-known knitting instructor Shanta Moitra for sharing her scarf pattern with us for our birthday. The graceful, lacy pattern with its pretty curves and its combination of textures was originally knit for Shanta's



sister-in-law. Knit with "Classic One Fifty", a gorgeous, soft, lightweight merino wool yarn from CLASSIC ELITE that provides excellent drape and stitch definition.

FINISHED SIZE: 7" X 64"

MATERIALS: CLASSIC ELITE "Classic One Fifty" (100% fine merino wool, 50 grams, 150 yards, CYCA yarn classification 3); US size 6 knitting needles, two stitch markers WAVE & SHIELD STITCH PATTERN (multiple of 14 + 1)

Row 1 (right side): K1; *yo, K2, P3, P3tog, P3, K2, yo, K1; repeat from *.

Row 2: *P4, K7, P3; repeat from * across, end P1.

Row 3: K1; *K1, yo, K2, P2, P3tog, P2, K2, yo, K2; repeat from *.

Row 4: *P5, K5, P4; repeat from *, end P1.

Row 5: K1; *K2, yo, K2, P1, P3tog, P1, K2, yo, K3; repeat from * .

Row 6: *P6, K3, P5; rep from *, end P1.

Row 7: K1; *K3, yo, K2, P3tog, K2, yo, K4; repeat from *.

Row 8: *P7, K1, P6; repeat from *, end P1.

Row 9: P2tog; *P3, K2, yo, K1, yo, K2, P3, P3tog; repeat from *, end last repeat P2tog.

Row 10: *K4, P7, K3; repeat from *, end K1.

Row 11: P2tog; *P2, K2, yo, K3, yo, K2, P2, P3tog; repeat from *, end last repeat P2tog.

Row 12: *K3, P9, K2; repeat from *, end K1.

Row 13: P2tog; *P1, K2, yo, K5, yo, K2, P1, P3tog; repeat from *, end last repeat P2tog.

Row 14: *K2, P11, K1; repeat from *, end K1.

Row 15: P2tog; *K2, yo, K7, yo, K2, P3tog; repeat from *, end last repeat P2tog.

Row 16: *K1, P13; repeat from *, end K1.

Repeat rows 1 - 16.

Original pattern source: *A Treasury of Knitting Patterns* by Barbara Walker, page 163. Note: Slip markers every row.

DIRECTIONS: Cast on 49 stitches. Knit 9 rows (5 garter ridges), end WS.

Set-up pattern (right side): K3 (garter edge), place marker (pm); beg with row 1, work wave & shield pattern across center 43 sts, pm; K3 (garter edge). Keeping 3 sts at beg & end every row in garter (K every row), work in pat until approx. 63" completed, end with row 8 or 16 of pattern. Knit 9 rows, end RS. BO all sts as if to knit on next row. Weave in ends. Block lightly.

*** FELTING WITHOUT AN AUTOMATIC WASHER ***

Kathy and Betty Lou recently attended the Deep Creek Knitting Retreat, including a Felted Flowers class from Nora Bellows of NONI DESIGNS. Their class projects for Camellia Flowers" (pattern \$6.50) will soon be on display. One of the big "no kidding" tips for felting small items is using a clean bucket, new toilet plunger, and very hot water. Add a little Eucalan wool wash to the mix and plunge strenuously until the item is felted to your liking. *** COLOR FORECAST ***

Each season, PANTONE surveys designers of New York Fashion Week to collect feedback on prominent collection colors, color inspiration and color philosophy to create the PANTONE Fashion Color Report, which serves as a reference tool for fashion enthusiasts and retailers. According to the PANTONE Fashion Color Report for Spring 2010, executive director Leatrice Eiseman, said: "Now, more than ever, women are vigilant when it comes to spending. Instead of reinventing their wardrobe at the start of each season, consumers want pieces to complement what they already own. Pairing a bold color with a basic piece or freshening up their look with bright accents addresses the need for practicality, as well as fun." Doesn't this make you glad to be a knitter or crocheter? You can have a great time MAKING those bright accents and an even better time wearing them!

According to the report, "Vibrant brights add a sense of excitement to the palette, especially when set against practical neutrals that provide a safety net for cautious consumers. Spring and summer naturally evoke feelings of calm ocean waters and tranquil beach vacations in cool, vibrant, tropical **Turquoise**. The soothing hue from the blue-green family conjures feeling of escape, especially when paired with **Amparo blue**. With more warmth than the typical spring navy, this particular shade of blue is extremely appealing because of its brighter, more energetic attitude. Like the scent of a blossoming flower, **Violet** lends a romanitc air to the warm-weather palette. This intruiging purplish hue is a distinctive addition to any wardrobe.

Yellow has made its mark on fashion and spring will further this trend with gleaming Aurora. Reminiscent of the first glimpse of yellow as the sun begins to rise over the horizon, this shimmering, slightly greenish yellow adds a bold infusion. Energy continues to surge throughout the warmer hues, leading to provocative Fusion Coral. This inviting orange connects directly to tangy Tomato Puree, this season's classic red. Pair it with Turquoise for a retro look. Thoughtful, cautious neutrals provide a dependable backbone to the brights of spring. Kick back and enjoy the bubbly luxury of Pink Champagne. This delicate, wispy tint is the season's newest neutral. The melding of Pink Champagne, Tomato Puree and Amparo Blue is a refreshing take on the classic springtime combination of red, white and blue.

Three additional neutrals round out the palette. **Tuscany**, a warm beige hue, provides the perfect backdrop and works well as a solid base with dynamic accents like **Fusion Coral** or **Violet**. **Dried Herb** is the ultimate green neutral, pairing well with all other colors. Ideal for bigger ticket items, **Eucalyptus** is the eternal, practical gray. Choose this nuanced neutral and add brightly colored exclamation points in shoes, jewelry and handbags."

Our own Tracey Earhart uses them very effectively in our beautiful "Happy Birthday" window display -- isn't she clever? Halla Miller recently completed a gorgeous pillow from the pink & purple shade of ROZETTI "Cocoon" yarn. When binding off a garter stitch project, Halla recommends working the bind-off row by knitting the first stitch, *then working the next 2 sts on the fine strand by knitting them together, then binding off; repeat from * until all stitches are bound off. This is a fun yarn for making easy projects. Stop in for our tutorial with Kathy on April 10 for tips on working with the new novelty yarns...
