Whether you love to make sweaters, crave accessories, are obsessed with socks, or adore home decor, we have plenty of projects you are sure to love. And projects are merely the beginning. We got the know-how, how-to's and expert support to guide you along your way. Here's what's new, what's now...

We are thrilled to ring in 2012 with an exciting new artisan yarn line, THE FIBRE COMPANY. Carrying on the tradition that gave New England its enchanting legacy of textile craftsmanship and design, THE FIBRE COMPANY offers a collection of hand knitting yarns made from unique blends of natural fibers including alpaca, cashmere, cotton, linen, merino, silk and soy. Expect sumptuously soft yarn in a gorgeous custom designed palette of kettle-dyed colors and beautifully handcrafted patterns with attention to detail, classic inspiration and modern style by distributors Kelbourne Woolens, owned by Courtney Kelly and Kate Gagnon Osborn.

New yarns now on our shelves are:

- "Acadia" \$13.50, shown upper left, 50 grams, 149 yards; 40% merino wool / 20% baby alpaca / 20% silk; CYCA #3, knits at 21 - 24 sts = 4"; a lovely, completely original and custom designed 2-ply yarn with a rustic look and soft hand. A subtle tweed effect created by the silk noil is combined with a heathered base and then overdyed in the duotones THE FIBRE COMPANY is known for, creating incredible depth of color...
- "Terra" \$16.50, 50 grams, 98 yards; 40% baby alpaca / 40% merino wool / 20% silk; CYCA #4 medium weight, knits at 18 - 20 sts = 4"; an absolutely beautiful worsted weight single-ply yarn. The blend of alpaca, merino and silk is spun and then kettle dyed into a wide array of gorgeous duotone tweed colors, resulting in yarn with exquisite depth of tone...
- "Savannah" \$15.50, 50 grams, 160 yards; 50% wool / 20% cotton / 15% linen, 15% soya; CYCA #3 light weight, knits at 22 - 25 sts = 4"; this 2-ply yarn with a crisp, yet soft hand. The unique blend of fibers are spun, then kettle dyed, with the fibers absorbing the dye differently for subtle heathered tones. Additionally, "Savannah" is spun and dyed in Pennsylvania, and we are proud to play a small role in supporting local textile mills here in our home state...

VOGUE KNITTING Winter 2011/12 (\$6.99, shown lower right) features knits you'll love to live in. Chase the chill in the luxurious comfort of wool, alpaca, mohair and angora. Sweater weather and the knitting season are in full swing. VOGUE presents capes and ponchos (as trendy as they were last fall), as well as knitted skirts (seen all over the fashion runways, whether short and flirty, or a more modest length). If you're too busy for a big project, try some of the snappy accessories (hats, gloves, socks, and the "urban turban"). They are just large enough to keep you interested, yet small enough that you can try a new stitch or two without being overwhelmed. The stitchwork and detail ingenuity make them unique and special. This issue of VOGUE encourages us to be: "At home in your knits. At home in your space. At home in the world. Relax, life is good"...



*** MORE GREAT NEW STUFF ***

New from CLAUDIA HANDPAINTED YARNS comes one texting mitts pattern with two spectacular-looking stitches, "Crossroads & Roundabout Fingerless Gloves" (\$6.50). The palm is worked in 2X2 rib for a perfect fit. Mitts are worked with just one hank of CLAUDIA's "Single Ply Wool" (\$14.50, 100% wool, 110 grams, 139 yards, CYCA #4), a soft chunky-weight yarn that is just right for cold weather wear and provides excellent stitch definition. In "Crossroads", the cables meet at the point and separate just so they can meet again, reminiscent of intersections. "Roundabout" (shown at right) features an interesting weave of cables that will keep your attention as you knit them. After you knit one style, you'll probably make the other as it's hard to choose a favorite...



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KNIT PICKS needle and accessories are arriving every week: interchangeable sets in nickel-plated, Harmony wood and acrylic; blocking mats; wooden yarn swifts; wool winders; cable connectors; extra needle tips / cables and more. Why shop online and pay expensive shipping & handling charges?

Looking for a do-able, fun project for winter? Try the CHURCHMOUSE cozy (\$5.50), of which they say "It's quick! Two movies and the news." In our shop and shops across America, a growing fan base is knitting the Shoulder Cozy and absolutely loving it. It knits up so effortlessly and yet the results are quite dramatic. Plus, you get to strand luxurious lace weight mohair together with slubby "Summer Tweed" -- or some equally dreamy combination (our shop model combines Summer Tweed with FILATURA DI CROSA Golden Line "Superior" cashmere and silk blend). The Cozy is versatile, and gives you the perfect touch of warmth for all seasons. Just scrunch it up under your coat (page 8, upper left) and then slip it over your shoulders when you get there (lower left this page). Or pleat the neck with a pretty pin. This flattering, barely shaped piece adds a splash of style however it's worn. For a gift, it's pretty much a sure thing, bound to please every body...

New shades of FIESTA's luxurious "La Boheme" yarn are here (\$30.50, 4 oz., 165 yards, 50% rayon / 32% brushed kid mohair / 14% wool / 4% nylon, CYCA #4). This elegant yarn is wonderful for scarves and shawls (ask to see LISA KNITS "On The Square" and KEEP IT SIMPLE "Ruffled Shawl", worked in this yarn). Check out "Color Cruise" shades La Serena and San Juan del Sur in a limited-time availability of select FIESTA yarns...

The sixth annual historical knitting issue of *Piecework* magazine is in! Discover finely knitted caps from the men of Peru, a classic baby cardigan, a re-creation of a 19th century edging for a 21st century shawl, a miser's purse, and a Victorian knitting challenge. Despite the barriers of language and time, "the knitting endures". This is true not only of the knitted items but also of the work of all the knitters featured in this issue and of the art of knitting itself. Enjoy!

*** PREDICTING COLOR TRENDS FOR 2012 ***

OK, winter has barely arrived, but the fashion forecast from last fall's NY Fashion Week brings you the most important color trends for spring / summer 2012. Color is where even the least adventurous knitters and crocheters can explore with confidence. Besides, don't you want to get a head start on spring stitching while introducing some fashion-forward shades into your work?

For spring 2012, designers are inspired by diverse influences, showcasing a range of styles and lifestyles -- from free and playful to light and breezy, and contemporary classics. Colors likewise reflect these differing moods, encapsulating vivid brights, soft muted tones and fun-loving pastels.

"Consumers look to spring for renewed energy, optimism and the promise of a brighter day," said Leatrice Eiseman, executive director of the Pantone Color Institute. "They have learned how color can help them alter a mood, while providing the vitality and enthusiasm that enables them to experiment with new looks and color combinations."

Pantone's choice for color of the year is provocative **tangerine tango**, an enticing juicy orange. This vivacious, appealing and refreshing shade will enliven anyone's outlook this spring. Providing a jolt of energy, **solar power** radiates warmth and cheer. "70s Appliances" includes gold, almond, avocado green, and muted mustard (aka **starfish**). Layered neutrals include oatmeals, browns, tans and grays (think **driftwood**, an adaptable blend of beige and gray with a slightly weathered feel)-- these natural, versatile shades add practicality to the season's brights. Pastels include blush pink, robin's egg blue, and mint green. Graphic black and white combos are being used in geometric, bold applications for added drama.

Rounding out Pantone's top 10 are **bellflower**, a distinct ornamental purple, which exudes uniqueness and creativity. Scintillating **cabaret** is a sensual, intense rosy-red -- an excellent choice for summer clothing and cosmetics. **Sodalite blue**, a classic maritime hue, brings order and calmness to mind. Like an anchor to a ship, this dependable shade works well with every color in the palette. **Cockatoo**, a tactile blue-green, is sure to make your spirits soar. This unusual hue adds a whimsical touch to the palette and will make a statement this spring. **Margarita**, a piquant yellow-green, lifts spirits with its refreshing and stimulating glow. Reminiscent of a blossoming garden on an early spring morning, **sweet lilac** evokes the fresh scents of summer. This delicate pinkish lilac adds a touch of romance to any wardrobe.

*** KNITTING TIPS AND TRICKS ***

Laura M had trouble keeping track of her double pointed knitting needles during a beginner sock class where other students had the exact same needles. She borrowed an idea that her husband uses to mark his golf balls. She takes a red permanent marker and makes three dots and some slashes to mark her knitting needles. Kathy adds that it would be a good idea to mark them with the same number of dots as the size of the needle (2 dots or slashes for US 2 dpns, 3 for US size 3, etc.). Then, you can always identify your needles and size at a glance...

Some yarn colors can cycle out of production rather quickly. Save a bit of leftover yarn, if needed for repairs later. Put the leftover yarn and label in a small zip-top bag. Write the name of the pattern, and for whom the project was made. If given as a gift, you may wish to give a bit of the yarn to the recipient to have on hand, along with care instructions...



*** INQUIRING KNITTERS WANT TO KNOW ***

Paula M asks, "What does it mean when the patterns says 'work even'?" This means to continue working in the pattern you have established, without any increases, decreases, or shaping.

New knitter Meghan J asks, "My stockinette scarf curls. Is there a stitch I can use that won't do this?" The natural tendency of stockinette stitch knitted fabric is to roll up at the cast on edge and curl under at the sides. Think of what happens with a rolled brim hat. Try working garter stitch (knit every row), a ribbed pattern (K1, P1 or K2, P2), or seed stitch. Seed stitch also works well for self-stripping or hand-painted yarns, as it tends to break up any pooling of color or "stacking" that may occur. To work seed stitch:

Odd number of stitches (multiple of 2 + 1)

All rows: K1; *P1, K1; repeat from * across row.

Even number of stitches (multiple of 2)

Row 1: *K1, P1; repeat from * across row.

Row 2: *P1, K1; repeat from * across row.

Repeat these two rows for pattern.

*** WINTER ICE SHAWL COWL ***

Eleanor Swogger created this simple lace cowl with a strand of KRAEMER YARNS "Sterling Silk and Silver" and a strand of "Fountain Hill" held together throughout the pattern. The model was knit with shades Heavenly Blue "Sterling Silk & Silver" and Surf's Up "Fountain Hill". The cowl can be wrapped twice around the neck or hung down for a long draping effect. Our thanks to Eleanor and KRAEMER YARNS for granting us permission to re-print this design in our newsletter. If one of your New Year's resolutions is to learn something new, this is a great way to try a provisional (temporary) cast on, lace knitting, grafting or 3-needle bind-off.

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS: 18 inches by 80 inches

MATERIALS: 2 hanks of Sterling Silk and Silver, 1 hank of Fountain Hill; US #9 24" circular needle, second needle of same size; crochet hook US size H for cast on; smooth cotton waste yarn for temporary cast on

GAUGE: 10.75 sts / 17 rows = 4" in pattern stitch, after blocking

DIRECTIONS:

Temporary Cast on: With US size H crochet hook, crochet a chain of about 55-60 stitches with the waste yarn. Extra stitches are crocheted to make pick up easier. If necessary a stitch can be skipped occasionally when picking up.

With US size 9 circular needle and both yarns held together, pick up 49 stitches through back loops (bumps) of crochet chain.

PATTERN STITCH:

Row 1: K2, *(yo, K2tog, K1) repeat from * to last two stitches, K2.

Repeat row 1 until piece is approximately 78 inches long or desired length. Remove temporary cast-on crochet chain one stitch at a time, placing live stitches on second needle of same size. Complete with three-needle bind off or by grafting beginning and end together.

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*** WE LOVE KATHY'S RAVELRY NEWS ***

In addition to our in-person "meet and greet" on the second Saturday of each month, the "We Love Kathy's" group's holiday KAL (knit-along) is the "Larch" shawlette, a free Ravelry pattern. Ask to see Kathy's finished (ta-da) project, knit from DREAM IN COLOR "Smoochy" in a gorgeous color-trendy shiny moss green shade. This project is do-able for a variety of skill levels from advanced beginner to experienced, and it is not too late to join the KAL.

Linda Lash will be co-ordinating another KAL for Kathy's "Cable & Textured Vest" designed for KRAEMER YARNS, starting January 1, 2012. The pattern is available for free at www.kraemeryarns.com, where you can view sizing and yarn requirements. This is the time to get past the holidays, make our DK weight yarn selection, make something for yourself or if you are still in the gifting mode, for someone else. Hope you can join in on the fun.
