We're serving up a slice of summer -- summer stitching, that is! Summer 2013 runs a gamut of styles -- from weird & wonderful to geek chic, gypsy folk, retro nostalgia, and light & lacy. Whether you love to make accessories, home decor, or garments, we've got plenty of warm-weather favorites to explore, like these new arrivals...

Knitting for family can be rewarding, and *Knitter's Magazine K111* Summer 2013 (\$6.95) focuses on family-friendly knits. There are sweet and sassy kid's

knits, downsized versions of popular grown-up knits that have appeared in previous issues. There are handsome cardigans for guys, including "Duo Personality" (shown upper left) by Kathy Zimmerman worked with KOLLAGE YARNS "Creamy Flame". *Knitter's* describes this as: "Not quite a brioche knit, this man's cardigan is crisp and linear. The small accent stripe and mock shawl collar offer clean year-round dressing".

Another clever feature of this issue is called "1 in Ten". Not everyone is a perfect small, medium, or large, so there is a series of sweaters sized in increments of 2". The silhouettes are simple wardrobe staples, so you can throw one on and face the day attractively. In addition there are designs with clever collars, splashes of color, needleplay techniques like entrelac, eyelets, and many more family-friendly ideas...

Happy summering! This season, it's all about the yarns and they are fabulous! We are featuring four new beauties from KNIT ONE, CROCHET TOO, known for inspiring yarns and innovative design. New arrivals include:

- --- "Cozette" \$8.95, 50 grams, 273 yards, 62% silk / 30% cotton / 8% polyamide; CYCA #2 fingering weight; this wonderfully soft yarn blend results in a finished fabric with slight texture and lovely drape, perfect for shawls, lace work, and crochet. And, how could we forget the gorgeous lace & cable "Heirloom Hearts Baby Blanket" pattern (\$5.50, shown upper right)? The motif at the center of the Lace Panel looks like a leaf in one direction (as you work it), and a heart in the opposite direction.
- --- "Ambrosia" \$11.95, 50 grams, 137 yards, 70% baby alpaca / 20% silk / 10% cashmere; CYCA #3; experience a luxury when knitting with this yarn, a perfect choice for lace garments and accessories like the "Wurm Hat" (ask us). The large color palette gives you a great selection to mix and match for intarsia and Fair Isle work.
- --- "Crock O Dye" \$24.50, 100 grams, 416 yards, 65% superwash wools / 20% nylon / 15% silk; CYCA #1; a gorgeous kettle-dyed silky yarn for scrumptious socks or shawls like KNITSPOT "Les Abeilles" (pattern in stock).
- --- "Dungarese" \$12.50, 100 grams, 250 yards, 60% cotton / 40% acrylic; CYCA #4;named for its faded denim look and ease of care (machine wash and dry). Wait until you feel how soft it is! Ask to see our "Gingham Top" shop model (\$5.50 pattern)

Looking for a quick-knit, breathable knit for summer? ROWAN YARNS "All Seasons Chunky" (\$13.50, 100 grams, 93 yards, 60% cotton / 40% acrylic, CYCA #5) breaks the lightweight cotton preference with openwork patterns to keep cool on summer days and evenings. Its gentle care blend of cotton and acrylic makes it easy to keep garments fresh and ready for a day walking the beach or an evening next to the campfire. Knits up quickly on a US 10.5 needle...

Make every day you knit like you're at "Carnival"! CIRCULO "Tecido Trico" (\$21.00, 32 yards, 100% polyester) is a colorful, trendy and fun sheer ruffling ribbon fabric. It features laser-punched holes along the edges that knit or crochet up into a lovely spiral in a jiffy. Work alone or intersperse with a traditional yarn for just a bit of ruffle. For design inspiration, see the spring / summer 2013 issue of *KNIT SIMPLE* magazine...

CLASSIC ELITE "Firefly" (\$9.50, 50 grams, 155 yards, 75% viscose / 25% linen, CYCA #3) is a warm-weather yarn with a subtle sheen and wonderful hand that makes it a bit dressy. The juxtaposition of the linen with a light-catching sheen gives it a distinctly feminine look. "Firefly" drapes beautifully at a wide range of gauges -- knit loosely for light, flowy, elegant lace or more tightly for stockinette fabrics. Our favorite "Firefly" accessory is "The Age of Brass and Steam" scarflette worn by Halla Miller to Fun Friday. It was a gift from her daughter for Mother's Day. How amazing to see this popular Ravelry pattern done in a summer yarn -- it completely changed the look! We see a new shop model in our future, and are now thinking about re-knitting some of our winter faves in "summer" yarns...



To knit these fabulous yarns, we have received new supplies of HIYA HIYA circular knitting needles, BATES beading crochet hooks, KA cable needles / accessories, KNITTER'S PRIDE Karbonz & Dreamz circular needles & more...

*** KNITTING TIPS AND TRICKS ***

Our thanks to members of the Laurel Highlands Knitting Guild for sharing these tips during their recent Spring Workshop with instructor Peggy Dailey. Here are some good ideas...

Judy Tlumac always counts her T-pins BEFORE and AFTER blocking to avoid any mishaps. Smart idea to avoid injuries, especially for households with small children, pets or cranky husbands...

The Old Norwegian cast-on technique was presented by Peggy Dailey during the workshop. This cast-on technique is similar to "long-tail cast on" but uses a longer tail due to a second twist in the thumb loop. Linda Honchar added that this method is also known as "German Twisted Cast-on", and works great for sock cuffs. Here's how it works:

Leaving a tail the necessary length, make a slipknot and place it on a knitting needle held in your right hand. The slipknot counts as the first stitch. Place the thumb and index finger of your left hand between the yarn ends so that the strand connected to the ball is around your index finger and the tail end is around your thumb. Secure the yarn ends with your other fingers and hold your palm upwards, making a "V" of yarn. Bring the needle in front of your thumb, under both yarns around the thumb, down into the center of the thumb loop, back forward, and over the top of the yarn around your index finger. Use the needle to catch this yarn, then bring the needle back down through the thumb loop, turning your thumb slightly to make room for the needle to pass through. Drop the loop off your thumb and place your thumb back in the "V" configuration while tightening up on the resulting stitch on the needle. Instructions published on www.knittingdaily.com

Joyce Bischoff uses two different colors of row counters when working garments -- one marker is to keep track of the pattern row, and the second one is for counting increases.

When Joyce picks up stitches around a garment neckline, she picks up one stitch in every space. On the first row of pattern, she decreases down to the desired number, making sure the stitches are properly spaced for a balanced neckline. This prevents holes or gaps.

When buying yarn on speculation, Joyce always purchase an ample amount (for example, a typical ladies' stockinette cardigan size large in worsted weight uses between 1600 & 1800 yards, so purchase one additional skein or 10% extra). When you bring the spec yarn home, do a stockinette gauge swatch with the size needles that give you a pleasing fabric, tag it with the needle size / gauge info and place it with the yarn before adding it with your stash. Then, when you are ready to work a project, you will know the gauge and needle size, so then you can match it up with an appropriate pattern to be determined later...

Mary Lou Fleming suggests that you always read the pattern first before starting your project, mark what size you are making and note what needle size you use. Make sure you understand all terms and abbreviations before starting. Mark the public side of your garment...

April Hyatt does not change row counter on completed row, but waits until she begins the next row. Always be consistent in your habits when counting rows, seaming, & planning...

Karen McCullough remembers her needle size by placing knots in the cast-on tail. Make the same number of knots as the needle size used for the swatch...

*** LINDA WILLS' BISCOTTI RECIPE ***

The First Mondays group at Panera raved so much about Linda Wills' biscotti recipe that we are re-printing it for all to enjoy. What is it about a knitting gathering that always includes food? Linda added coconut & dried pineapple to our sample; add whatever dried fruits/nuts you like! 1/2 cup **butter**, softened

1-1/2 cups sugar

4 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla extract (or whatever flavor extract you like)

3- 3/4 cups all-purpose flour


2 tsps. baking powder

dash of salt

- In a bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add 4 eggs, one at a time, beating well after each.
 Beat in vanilla. Combine the flour, baking powder and salt; gradually add to the creamed
 mixture. Divide dough into two portions; shape each into an 8" X 2" rectangle on
 ungreased baking sheets.
- Refrigerate for 1 hour.
- Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool for 5 minutes.
 Transfer to a cutting board, cut diagonally with a serrated knife into 3/4-inch slices. Place cut side down on ungreased baking sheets.
- Bake for 12-14 minutes or until golden brown, turning once. Cool on wire racks. Dip one
 end in icing glaze or drizzle over top. Store in an airtight container. Yield: 4 dozen.

*** JEANNE'S REVERSIBLE ROMAN STRIPE SCARF ***

Our thanks to Jeanne Osman for sharing this charming lacy scarf pattern. The fabric is reversible, since there are an odd number of rows (seven). Pattern may be made wider or narrower by increasing or decreasing in multiple of 2 stitches. It can be given a right and wrong side by omitting row 7 and doing the pattern with only 6 rows. The



pattern stitch originally apeared in Barbara Walker's *Second Treasury of Knitting Patterns*, also available on our bookshelf. This stitch works well for summer weight accessories, shawls and baby blankets.

FINISHED SIZE: 5.5" X 60" after blocking

MATERIALS: Sport weight cotton or linen blend approx. 300 yards; US #5 knitting needles (shown in TAHKI "Cotton Classic Lite")

GAUGE: 6 sts / 8 rows = 1", after blocking

ROMAN STRIPE PATTERN STITCH (even number of stitches, abbreviations below)

Row 1: K1; *yo, K1; repeat from * across to last stitch, end K1.

Row 2: K1, purl across to last stitch, end K1.

Row 3: K1; *K2tog; repeat from * across to last stich, end K1.

Rows 4 & 5: K1; *yo, K2tog; repeat from * across to last stitch, end K1.

Rows 6 & 7: Knit.

Repeat rows 1 - 7 for pattern. Count stitches on row 6, as stitch count is not constant throughout pattern.

DIRECTIONS: With long tail cast on method, cast on 32 stitches. K 3 rows. Work in Roman Stripe pattern for 60" or desired length, ending with row 7 of pattern. Bind off all stitches as if to knit on next row. Block and enjoy!

*** CHEVRON SCARF ***

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS: 5" X 60"

MATERIALS: Fingering weight 350 yards (tonal handpainted yarns or variegated yarn with high contrast will work well); US size 5 knitting needles; tapestry needle for weaving in ends.

GAUGE: 7 sts = 1", after blocking

NOTE: Divide yarn into two equal balls and work two sections which will be seamed at mid-back neck OR wind yarn into a cake and work both pieces at the same time, one from center and one from outside . PATTERN STITCH (detail shown lower left)


Row 1 (right side): K2, knit into front & back of next stitch (Kf& b), K2tog, [yo, K2, central double dec, K2, yo, K2] twice, yo, k2, central dbl dec, K2, yo, ssk, kf&b, K2.

Row 2 & all wrong-side rows: K3, purl 29, K3.

Repeat rows 1 & 2 for pattern.

DIRECTIONS (make two): Cast on 35 stitches with long tail method. K 3 rows. Work in pattern until piece measures 30" long

or desired length. Join pieces using three-needle bindoff method. Weave in ends. Block lightly, if needed. ABBREVIATIONS: K- knit; Kf&b - knit into front & back of stitch; K2tog - knit 2 together; p-purl;ssk - slip, slip, knit decrease; st - stitch; yo - yarn over



<repeat these 9 sts once>

*** BUILDING BLOCKS CLASS SERIES WITH LISA CARNAHAN ***

Twist stitches are members of the cable stitch family. Right twists are simple to execute and are often used to compliment cable patterns. In this class, Lisa shows how to do this two-stitch mini-cable made without the use of a cable needle. We have had such an overwhelming response to this series that we now have two groups meeting on **Saturday**, **June 29**, **2013**, **at either 10 am - 12 noon**, **or 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm**. The goal of stitching is to enjoy the process -- and get a finished project that is used and loved. When a knit is used, it brings the recipient warmth, joy and pleasure. Each wearing means the garment is loved, and it includes the love you have worked into every stitch. Live, love, laugh, knit, crochet! KEEP KNITTING AND CROCHETING! Kathy
