Fall is all about color. Fall 2012's fashion knitwear story is "cozy meets colorful". From a variety of silhouettes and new fabrications, fusion is the key this fall. In addition, shimmer and shine add a new level of sophistication to the season. Color can transform a mood or even an attitude. It can set ideas in motion. Add a pop of happy color to your knitting and crochet projects, particularly accessories -- set against a neutral background, a snazzy color can lift your spirits. One of the joys of making it your own is that you can use the colors that make you happiest. Dive into our colorful collection of natural fiber yarns and more wonderful products like these to jumpstart your creativity...

Couldn't get to Kathy's "Working With Self-Striping Yarns" class at Knitter's Day Out last month? Now you can purchase her original design stashbuster created just for the class, "Paintbox Fingerless Mitts" (\$4.00, shown upper left). Knit with one ball each of two colorways of KNIT ONE, CROCHET TOO's "Paintbox" (\$9.50, 50 grams, 100 yards, 100% wool, CYCA #4) in an easy striped pattern alternating the two shades. There is quite a bit of fashion interest in the fingertips these days. The fingerless mitts can show off your mani and still leave your fingers free for texting, driving (no texting while driving, please!), or enjoying your favorite cup of tea or coffee. Our knitting friend Judy Tlumac suggests wearing leather gloves or stretchy tight gloves under these fingerless mitts when the temperatures dip...

For many stitchers, there is a reassuring comfort in yarns that work into substantial knitwear. You know the kind we mean -- the cozy, comfortable cardigans, pullovers, hats, scarves and mittens we reach for when heading out for a brisk walk on a chilly morning, raking leaves, or on our daily commute. These are the yarns that pair so well with simple shapes, traditional cables, and straight-forward knit-and-purl patterns. These are also the yarns that sometimes surprise us in their affinity for lace patterns and delicate stitches. "Shepherd's Wool" by STONEHEDGE FIBER MILL is one such yarn (\$13.50, 4 oz./ 250 yards, 100% worsted spun fine wool , CYCA #4). Made in the USA, this soft yet sturdy yarn is an excellent choice for a wide variety of projects and provides superb stitch definition. Did we mention it felts well too?

INTERWEAVE presents special issue *Knit.wear Fall 2012* (\$14.99, shown lower right), celebrating lush minimalistic textures, sculptural lace, and sharply-defined gathered knit fabric. Cozy up with knitwear-inspired decor for your knitted nest in softly spun yarns yielding lofty stitches with impact. We highly recommend the tutorial by Ann Budd "Start To Finish" for the comprehensive array of cast-on and bind-off techniques (a "must-have" for any knitter's library)...

Holiday shopping may not already be on your mind, but we're pretty sure that knitting *is*. What better way to get a jump on your gift list than to begin making those presents right now? We've been making one of our all-time best-selling patterns, CHURCHMOUSE DESIGNS "Welted Fingerless Gloves" (\$5.50, shown right), with one of our all-time favorite yarns, ROWAN "Felted Tweed" (\$10.50, 50 grams, 191 yards, 50% merino wool / 25% alpaca / 25% viscose, CYCA #3, photo page six). We think you might love them, too! This yarn produces a "quiet luster" fabric that has body, softness and drape -- the best of all worlds. It is also machine wash gentle cycle, a handy feature for gloves. Although "Felted Tweed" colorways span the seasons, there are so many that are perfectly suited to the autumnal turning leaves, darkening hedges and the softer light of shorter days...



Each of the timeless, yet fashion-forward designs bears a French name -- as only the effortless chic of the French women can match the elegance of these styles. The "Anais" sleeveless top, shown lower left, is knit from "Adele" (\$20.50, 50 grams, 169 yards, 43% viscose / 28% polyester / 20% kid mohair / 9% polyamide, CYCA #3) combines a metallic thread with a mohair halo strand and tiny sequins. These designs easily transition from dressy daytime to evening elegance with panache. Subtle sequins and metallics have replaced last season's self-ruffling yarns for the season's hottest look in scarfs and wraps, too...

For everyday and kids' wear, our new arrival "Weekend Chunky" (\$6.95, 100 grams, 119 yards, 75% acrylic / 25% cotton) from BERROCO is yarn you've been waiting for! This yarn is an excellent choice for those who are sensitive to wool and animal fibers, and it is easy care, machine washable...



Straight from Kathy's Kreations Fall Fling Weekend in mid-September comes KRAEMER YARNS "Baby Blocks" Mitered Blocks Baby Afghan designed by our guest instructor Eleanor Swogger. Eleanor constructed the blanket out of individual squares, which are picked up and knit from each other -- no sewing required! Worked with five shades of KRAEMER "Perfection Worsted" (\$6.95, 100 grams, 200 yards, 30% domestic merino / 70% acrylic), this charmer is also available as a kit (\$58.00). The afghan can be modified to a larger size or to use any combination of colors you choose...



*** NOW ON OUR BOOKSHELVES ***

Kids are -- and should be -- Little Rascals. Look inside the MILLAMIA "Little Rascals" book (\$27.95, soft cover, shown upper left) to see them at their playful best, enjoying themselves in their handknitted clothes. Knits for kids can be playful and comfortable yet also sophisticated, pleasing both the wearer and their style-conscious moms. Handknits can be part of a child's fun, mischievous, imaginative day. Catering to ages from newborn to seven years old depending on the design, the patterns span dresses, cardigans, babygrows, sweaters and accessories including blankets, scarves and hats.

There are plenty of goodies in both the Beginner and Improving skill level categories, including a tie-wrap ballet cardigan and a batwing sweater with an asymmetrical neckline. Whimsical detailing -- bows instead of buttons on a sassy cardi, a massive striped hand-warming pocket on an otherwise all-stockinette scarf, a bright kangaroo pouch on an irresistible baby onesie -- place these designs smack dab in cutesy Kiddyland. While girls get a little more attention, styles for boys are elegant without being stuffy. A clever feature suggests alternate color choices for every garment, helpful for stitchers who want to visualize what a garment will look like in substituted shades...

Discover top-down knitting from the ground up with *The Knitter's Handy Book of Top-Down Sweaters* by Ann Budd (\$29.95, spiral bound). Answering to a growing interest in knitting sweaters from the top down and knitting seamless sweaters that require little finishing, this book offers instructions for knitting four basic sweater types: seamless yoke, raglan, set-in sleeve and saddle-shoulder. Ann includes beautiful patterns for children and adults in multiple sizes and yarn gauges that serve as springboards for creative expression.

For each of the four sweater types, after the basics of construction are addressed, three full sweater patterns are featured -- for a total of twelve sweater patterns in the book. Alongside Budd's own designs, each section features one topnotch guest designer: Jared Flood, Veronik Avery, Pam Allen, and Anne Hanson. ***** EDITOR'S NOTE: Anne Hanson was just announced as Kathy's Kreations Spring Break guest instructor! Anne's top-down raglan cardigan for this book is shown lower right. *****

With personal design touches, detailed charts, clear instruction, and quick tips for expanding knitting possibilities, this *Handy* book will kick your knitting needles into overdrive...

Knitting traditions and connections are everywhere, sometimes in the most unlikely places. Sprinkled through the latest special publication of INTERWEAVE's *Knitting Traditions Fall 2013* (\$14.99) are projects taken from *Piecework's* collection of vintage magazines, with a few incorporating crochet techniques. The patterns are divided into seven sections: wraps, hand & arm coverings, head coverings, feet & leg coverings, bags, household items, sweaters and the companion stories that frame projects with cultural background. This issue is packed with historical context on the craft's rich history, stories about extraordinary knitters, and projects for new and lifelong knitters to enjoy...

In today's knitting world, Stephen West is the king of shaping and beautiful drape. The designs in *Westknits Book Three* (\$22.00, soft cover) are clever, flattering and the easy-to-follow patterns are well written. Through the use of simple elements and striking color techniques, Stephen West proves that a good pattern design is more a matter of good taste than complicated knitting. Because the complexity in his designs lies in the design itself and not in the technique, his patterns are accessible to knitters at many levels of proficiency. *Westknits Book Four* will be available in November 2012 and we are accepting advance reservations now. We stock many of Stephen West's individual patterns, including "Vulpix" and "Chevry" top-down shawls and others...



*** INQUIRING KNITTERS WANT TO KNOW ***

Karen McC asks: "What does the term CYCA and the numbers that you use in yarn descriptions mean?"

CYCA is the Craft Yarn Council of America, which sets standards for sizing and yarn weight categories. These are indicated on the yarn ball band with a small yarn logo, shown below. You can learn a lot from the ball band. Locate the yarn weight and Stockinette Stitch gauge range over 4" / 10 cm. and compare to the chart. These guidelines apply to commonly used gauges and needle sizes in specific yarn categories.

Sharyn L asks: "I am finishing a sweater that my late mother started. It is half done and I have some yarn, but I just don't have any idea of how many balls she used for the back. How do I know how much I will need?"

Kathy answers: If you still have the ball band, check how many yards are in ounces or grams. Weigh the pieces you have finished. If they weigh 200 grams for example and you have 109 yards in a 50 gram ball, then she would have used 4 balls or 436 yards. You will need approximately that amount to finish the remaining half of the project.

If you are knitting a pullover with the patterning pretty much equal throughout the garment and standard length, the back will generally take 1/3 of the total yardage, the front and neck about 1/3 and both sleeves the remaining 1/3. This is a general estimate and may not be true if you have a heavily textured pattern in your project or a longer body length (tunic). However, this a close estimate that may work for your situation. This is a good example of why you should always save ball bands until the project is completed.

In the event that you will not have enough yardage, some creativity is in order. Try working color blocking, add stripes, work bands / collar / trims in a contrasting color or novelty yarn, or shortening the sleeves to a 3/4 length (knit both at the same time to make sure they will be the same length).

*** KNIT TIPS FROM KATE LEMMERS ***

There are many rules and helpful hints about knitting. Taking her cue from David Letterman, our knitting friend Kate Lemmers offers her top 10 overall, good basic, "wouldn't-hurt-you-to-know" personal knitting tips. Thanks, Kate! 10. Knit on something every day.
9. Knit something for yourself every year.
8. After 3 mistakes at night, put your knitting down and go to bed.
7. Try something new. There are so many great things to knit -- lace, cables, socks, shawls, garments, accessories, lace weight to bulky. Try something new to keep your craft fun and interesting. It is good for your brains, too!
6. Keep learning. As old as knitting is, there is always someone out there discovering something new.
5. Swatches are good for so many things, especially a finished product that turns out great.
4. Learn to read your knitting, and then you will always know where you are in the pattern.
3. Work with the best materials and tools you can afford. The investment you make in your knitting will show in your finished product.
2. There is no right way to knit. As long as you are getting the fabric you desire, you are doing it right. Don't let anyone tell you any different. BUT -- specific techniques performed in a required manner may be needed to produce some specific results.
1. The #1 tip and trick for saving time and producing good knitting is: Check your work frequently for measurements, gauge, and mistakes. Finding the issue fast saves yarn, prevents ripping, and keeps you enthusiastic.

*** WHAT IS A SHORT ROW? ***

Short rows are used to work partial rows when shaping knitting pieces. Working a partial (i.e. "short") row increases the number of rows in one area without having to bind off stitches in another; the number of stitches remains constant. This type of shaping eliminates the stair-step edges that occur when a series of stitches are bound off, as is commonly used to shape shoulders and necks. Short rows are also used to add bust darts or extra length wherever you need it.

*** CROCHET RIBBED HAT ***

This hat is often mistaken for a knitted hat. It is easy to crochet by working single crochet side-to-side in the back loops only, then gathering the hat into a tube. It is very easy and works up fast. Our thanks to KRAEMER YARNS for sharing this pattern with us, and to the designer, Clara Masessa!

Sizes: Child's without fold-up (child's with fold-up, adult's without fold-up, adult's with fold-up in parentheses); adult's fold-up shown in photo lower left

Materials: KRAEMER YARNS "Perfection Worsted" 1 (1,1,2) skeins; US crochet hook size H (5.0 mm); tapestry needle

Gauge: 3.5 sc = 1"

Directions: Chain 28 (26, 35, 47).

- Row 1: Starting in second chain from hook, single crochet (sc) across, chain 1, turn. Mark first row as the right side of work.
- Row 2: Working in back loops only, sc across, chain 1, turn.
- Repeat row 2 until work measures 16" (16", 17", 17"), ending with a wrong side row. With wrong sides together, slip stitch the front loop of facing side and the single loop of starting chain together across row. End off, leaving a 24" tail of yarn. Using a long-eye tapestry needle, gather this end of tube together using a whip stitch and fasten off. Weave in loose ends.

*** SADDLE SHOULDERS ***

With the return of Aran cable sweaters this fall, saddle shoulders are making a comeback. *Knitting Daily's* editor Kathleen Cubley in her review of *The Handy Book of Top-Down Sweaters* by Ann Budd (see page four): "Saddle-shoulder sweaters, named for the extensions of the sleeves (also called saddles or sleeve straps) that extend from the neck to the tops of the sleeve caps, have a classic fit. Like sweaters with set-in sleeves, saddle-shoulder sweaters have no excess fabric at the armholes and therefore have a clean, tailored silhouette that is well-suited for close-fitting variations.

More importantly, the shoulder straps provide a prominent area in which to showcase a design element, perhaps in a textured stitch pattern or contrasting color".
